A proven success as a program builder, recruiter and game strategist who has won 670 games as a collegiate head coach, Bob Huggins has directed his alma mater to 80 victories and back-to-back-to-back appearances in the NCAA tournament during his first three seasons in Morgantown. Huggins, a 1977 graduate of West Virginia University, was introduced as WVU's 21st men's basketball coach on Good Friday, April 6, 2007. Huggins, 56, has compiled a 670-240 (.736) record now in his 28 seasons as a head coach, which includes stints at Walsh College (1980-83), Akron (1984-1989), Cincinnati (1989-2005), Kansas State (2006-07) and West Virginia (2007-present).

He ranks fourth in total victories and 12th in winning percentage among active Division I head coaches. Huggins' teams have participated in postseason play in 25 of his 28 seasons, including 18 NCAA tournaments. His squads have won 20 or more games in all but four of his 28 campaigns, including 30 or more twice, and he has averaged 23.7 victories a season. In 2008-09, Huggins led the Mountaineers to 23 victories in his second season at WVU, advancing to the NCAA tournament for the second year in a row. Huggins became the second Mountaineer coach to win 20 games in his first two seasons in Morgantown. The Mountaineers reached the semifinals of the BIG EAST championship for the second year in a row. After the season, Huggins was named state coach of the year by the West Virginia State Sports Writers Association, his second-consecutive honor.

In his first season at WVU, Huggins took the Mountaineers to the NCAA Sweet 16, becoming the first Mountaineer coach to take a team that far in NCAA tournament play in his first season. With 26 victories, he won more games in his first year than any other coach in WVU history. West Virginia tied the school record for BIG EAST victories with 11. After finishing the season with a No. 17 ranking, Huggins was named state coach of the year by the W.Va. State Sportswriters Association.

Following Huggins' first season at WVU, Pastilong announced that Huggins signed a 10-year contract extension that will keep the veteran coach at his alma mater until his 65th birthday. Huggins also had his sixth first round NBA draft pick and fourth lottery pick when WVU's Joe Alexander was selected as the eighth pick by the Milwaukee Bucks. On Dec. 22, 2007, Huggins became the 29th Division I coach (minimum 10 years coaching in Division I) to reach 600 victories when the Mountaineers won at Canisius.

Huggins was a three-year all-Ohio selection and the 1972 Ohio Player of the Year while playing for his father, Charles, at Indian Valley South High in Gnadenhutten, Ohio. He first attended Ohio University but transferred to West Virginia after his freshman season. Huggins was a three-year letterman for the Mountaineers under Gardner from 1975-77. As a senior and tri-captain, he helped the squad to an 18-11 overall record and a tie for the Eastern Collegiate Basketball League (ECBL) Western division title. In addition to helping the team earn its highest win total in nine seasons, he was named MVP after pacing the squad with 3.8 assists per game average. A two-time Academic All-American, Huggins graduated from West Virginia magna cum laude in 1977 and received his master's in health administration from WVU in 1978. Huggins was born in Morgantown on Sept. 21, 1953. He and his wife, June, have two daughters, Jenna Leigh and Jacqueline.

- Huggins has coached nine All-Americans and 51 all-conference selections.
- Huggins has coached 15 NBA draft picks, including six first round selections and four lottery picks.
- Huggins has won 13 conference regular season titles. Huggins has won 10 conference tournament titles.
- Huggins ranks 21st among the NCAA's all-time winningest coaches.
- WVU's 19 victories away from home (12 neutral, seven away) are the most by any Division I college basketball team.
- WVU has been ranked 18 weeks in the AP Top 10 under Bob Huggins, the second most by any coach in WVU history.
- Huggins became just the second coach in school history to win 20 games in each of his first three seasons.
- Huggins won his 80th WVU game against Kentucky and has the school record for most wins through three years by a WVU coach.
- West Virginia sold more than 7,700 season tickets, the most ever in school history.
- WVU set school records for average and total attendance this season. WVU averaged 12,377 fans. Total attendance 173,281.

He is a veteran of numerous large and small scale Law Enforcement Tactical Team deployments in Otsego County NY and in 2005; he was deployed with the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) to New Orleans, LA to provide Tactical Medical Support for both, FBI Houston and FBI Miami Division SWAT Teams during the aftermath of hurricane Katrina.

Ed currently holds the position of Director of Operations and Training at Pathfinder Operations, LLC a privately held corporation specializing in tactical training, consulting and direct mission support for Tactical Operations, Law Enforcement and Executive Protection projects. He currently lives in Oneonta NY with his wife, Lori.

Lt. Col. Dave Grossman

Lt. Col. Dave Grossman is an internationally recognized scholar, author, soldier, and speaker who is one of the world's foremost experts in the field of human aggression and the roots of violence and violent crime.

Col. Grossman is a former West Point psychology professor, Professor of Military Science, and an Army Ranger who has combined his experiences to become the founder of a new field of scientific endeavor, which has been termed "killology." In this new field Col. Grossman has made revolutionary new contributions to our understanding of killing in war, the psychological costs of war, the root causes of the current "virus" of violent crime that is raging around the world, and the process of healing the victims of violence, in war and peace.

Col. Grossman has been called upon to write the entry on "Aggression and Violence" in the *Oxford Companion to American Military History*, three entries in the *Academic Press Encyclopedia of Violence* and numerous entries in scholarly journals, to include the *Harvard Journal of Law and Public Policy*.

He is the author of *On Killing*, which was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize; has been translated into Japanese, Korean, and German; is on the U.S. Marine Corps Commandant's required reading list; and is required reading at the FBI academy and numerous other academies and colleges. Col. Grossman co-authored *Stop Teaching Our Kids to Kill: A Call to Action Against TV, Movie and Video Game Violence*, which has been translated into Norwegian and German, and has received international acclaim. Col. Grossman's most recent book, *On Combat*, has also placed on the U.S. Marine Corps Commandant's Required Reading List and has been translated into Japanese and Korean.

He has presented papers before the national conventions of the American Medical Association, the American Psychiatric Association, the American Psychological Association, and the American Academy of Pediatrics.

He has presented to over 50 different colleges and universities worldwide, and has trained educators and law enforcement professional, in the field of school safety, at the state and regional level, in 49 states and over a dozen foreign nations.

He helped train mental health professionals after the Jonesboro school shootings, and he was also involved in counseling or court cases in the aftermath of the Paducah, Springfield, Littleton, Virginia Tech, and Nickel Mines Amish school shootings.

He has been an expert witness and consultant in state and Federal courts, to include serving on the prosecution team in UNITED STATES vs. TIMOTHY MCVEIGH.

He has testified before U.S. Senate and Congressional committees and numerous state legislatures, and he and his research have been cited in a national address by the President of the United States.

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Col. Grossman is an Airborne Ranger infantry officer, and a prior-service sergeant and paratrooper, with a total of over 23 years experience in leading U.S. soldiers worldwide. He retired from the Army in February 1998 and has devoted himself to teaching, writing, speaking, and research. Today he is the director of the Killology Research Group, and in the wake of the 9/11 terrorist attacks he is on the road almost 300 days a year, training elite military and law enforcement organizations worldwide about the reality of combat.

Dave Larton

Dave Larton is Coastal Region ACS Officer for the California Emergency Management Agency (CalEMA). Based at CalEMA's Regional Emergency Operations Center in Oakland, Dave currently manages the staff of a sixteen County area ranging from the Oregon border to the Monterey County line.

Dave has more than thirty-five years of emergency services experience, including thirteen as a Dispatcher/Trainer for the Gilroy, (CA) 9-1-1 Communications Center. He was named the 1999 recipient of the Ramona Raymond Pillar of Excellence Training Award by the Santa Clara County Public Safety Communications Managers Association, and was twice named the Department's Dispatcher of the Year.

A nine-year veteran of the Department's Hostage Negotiation Team, Dave has served as a Tactical Dispatcher, a certified Basic and Advanced Hostage Negotiator and Technical Specialist. He is a California POST certified Peer Crisis Counselor, and is a member of the International Critical Incident Stress Foundation (ICISF). He is a certified S-258 Communications Incident Technician (COM-T) as well as an Incident Communications Center Manager (INCM). As a Communications Specialist with California's Urban Search & Rescue Task Force 3, Dave responded to the World Trade Center in September of 2001. Dave also served with the Olympic Public Safety Command at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City, Utah. He is rated as a Weapons of Mass Destruction First Responder, and is a graduate of the Federal Department of Homeland Security's COBRA WMD School in Anniston, Alabama.

Dave is a Founding Member of the National Incident Dispatchers Association, a member of the California Association of Hostage Negotiators, NENA, APCO, and a former Vice President of the California Fire Chiefs Association (Communications Section, Northern Division), the California Tactical Dispatchers Association, the California Association of Police Training Officers, and the National Association of Field Training Officers. Dave is a Commercial Regional Vice President for NENA's California State Chapter, CALNENA. He is the Associate Editor of *9-1-1 Magazine*, and has been a contributing author for *Homeland Protection Professional magazine*.

He is the co-author of *"Incident Dispatcher: A Guide for the Professional Tactical and Incident Dispatcher"*. Dave has been a technical consultant to the media, including script preparation for the 'Ally McBeal' television show and the History Channel. A popular national 9-1-1 Instructor and Trainer, Dave serves First Contact 9-1-1 as its Operations Section Chief.
